And every single bell ringer stepped up, ringing with pride, enthusiasm and skill across the two weeks from the time the Monarch's death was announced, to her final laying to rest at Windsor

The whole day, from what I could see from the snippets of videos on BBC News, looked to be the most extraordinary, spectacular and moving event, a wonderful tribute to our departed Monarch. It was a wonderful event, albeit very sombre, full of pageantry, itself preceded by a memorable 2 weeks. So much outpouring of emotion, a country coming together with so many other people around the world,

Margaret, looking at the stones of the wall, suddenly had an image revealed to her; lo and behold she could see a dog in the stone. Everyone agreed it looked like a Corgi!! All were amazed!!! A fitting image to finish up with perhaps?

At Dilhorne, at 10am, there were 6 ringers until 10:15am, when 3 ringers left for other towers; then 3 ringers rang until 10:30am; for

the last ten minutes there was ringing with 5 ringers as some had arrived from Caverswall. Each ringer took it in turn to toll the tenor 96 times.

The ringers finished by sharing tea and cake with Her Majesty!

COMMEMORATIVE BADGES

Following the sad news on Thursday 8th September, bells were ringing out all over the world to mark the



passing of HM Queen Elizabeth II.

To commemorate the ringing for this historic event, members from the Leicester Diocesan Guild have commissioned some bellringing badges to mark the occasion. The proposed design is one specially commissioned from Rebecca Banner, who also designed a badge to mark the ringing for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee (which was purple - see photo and end of article if you'd like to order one). These new badges would be a gold-coloured base metal with black enamel - see photo. The badge will cost only £5, including P&P, with the profits being donated to the Leicester Diocesan Guild Bell Repair Fund and the All Saints. Loughborough tower fund. The badges were ordered from the manufacturer September 15th and take approximately 3-4 weeks for production.

terrible prank!! And it wasn't ghosts, although what a great story that would have been! The stay on the third bell, which was waiting to be changed, decided to snap! So, number 3 bell simply rang itself.

Thanks to Ray for making the stay, and Andy for fitting it, all was well for Saturday ringing school.

Wobbly CLAPPERS at SANDON ALL SAINTS

For some years now we have had wobbly clappers in 3 of the bells which has made

them difficult to ring. They have been refurbished and now all is well, as they are easier to ring and sound a true note, (as you can now doubt hear).

The bearings were greased annually which helped, but 60 years since the last re-bushing had meant that the pivot/bearings had worn considerably.

Bells 2, 3 and 4 had become difficult to ring and after the Platinum Jubilee the clappers were unbolted from the top of the bells and taken to John Taylor & Co of Loughborough, bell founders, who refaced and built-up the clapper ball faces, grinding them back to their spherical shape, original fully furnace annealled the clappers and re-bushed the clapper tops with resiliently mounted precision oilite bushes and refitted them. The cost was £718 plus vat, but thanks to a grant of £200 from the North Staffordshire Association of Changeringers, Bell Restoration Fund, for which we are very grateful, it was possible to have this work done.

ST PETER'S ALTON



The lovely 22cwt 8 at Alton were cast and installed in 1959 and are now in need of a full overhaul of

the fittings and also cleaning and repainting of the frame. After much

discussion we are now well on

the way with a project to remove all the bells and frame from the tower and to augment to 10. This

will have the advantage that the steel and iron frame can be shot blasted and galvanized before painting, the headstocks can be fitted with clapper adjustment screws and, importantly, we will add

two bells to give us a light 6. While the bells go well, the back 6 are a bit of a handful for the less



experienced and the front 6, in the words

of the DAC bell advisor, yields "a musical scale that defies easy description and a sub-optimal aural experience for the listener".



We will, of course, still have the lovely 8 as well as a lovely 10.

From the Mobile Belfry at the County Show and through the publicity about our project locally we have had a big influx of new ringers in the last 12 months, which is really good. We can now get up to 10 new ringers at rounds and simple call changes at a practice so, if we can keep making progress while the bells are out, we should at least be able to ring call changes on all the bells when they are back.



The last peal before augmentation was rung on 23rd August and by ringing the tenor I circled the tower to peals – just in the nick of time!



On 25th August we had a trip to Loughborough for a tour of the foundry and to see the two new trebles being cast. We also had a ring on the bells at the foundry and did better than we might have expected given that they are like our front 3 with 9 extra trebles.

We have started stripping down the 7th and Tenor and all the bells and frame are due to go to the foundry in October and we hope they will be back in the tower to ring for Easter next year.

Geoff and Linda Pick came to Staffordshire in the late sixties and over the succeeding fifty

years made a huge contribution to ringing in the area, particularly at Cannock. Earlier this

year they decided to move to the North Bristol area to be near their daughter Jenny. Geoff

has been an occasional member of the Woodlands Wednesday band since 1997, always willing to ring when needed and happy to help us out at short notice, so we decided that his departure should be marked in an appropriate way. His last appearance as a

Staffordshire resident was to be on June 22nd, and we managed to put together an

appropriate band, mostly from our regular squad but with a guest appearance from Simon Linford, who was taught to ring at Cannock by Geoff when his father was incumbent there.

The band included Steve Askew, one of Geoff's successors as secretary of the Lichfield and Walsall Archdeaconries Society, and another successor, Jean Nixon, was originally in the band but had to withdraw

because of illness and she wishes to be associated with this quarter peal.

The band's combined peal total with Geoff was 267, not that high but not trivial. Similarly, Geoff's total at Woodlands was 24, which made us his third most popular tower after

Cannock and Bloxwich. But he is noted not so much for the number he has rung at any one tower, but for the number of towers, 378 in all, and he is the only ringer to have rung peals in all 141 towers in traditionally defined Staffordshire. We suggested that Geoff should choose the method, and when he told us he would like to ring old-fashioned fivespliced we were slightly concerned that Simon might be disappointed that there were no new pickled egg methods, but he declared himself happy with the choice. We had two ringers who had not rung a peal at Woodlands, Simon Linford and Gordon Birks. We did not manage a peal, but Geoff called a quarter of Yorkshire before we went to the pub. This was our only ringing during June, and the practices fared little better because of holidays and illness. But we managed to maintain Sunday ringing, although not always on all six.

On July 2nd, on the morning of the meeting at Madeley, a visiting band rang a peal at Keele, the first peal on the bells since December 2017. Woodlands Wednesday continued to have mixed success, with two peals in July and two in August.

August I visits During paid two to Loughborough with Simon Lingford to view progress on the new mobile belfry, which has continued to be slow, as a result of which we decided it was not ready to be launched at the Roadshow on September 4th. As a substitute the Lichfield mobile was booked to go, and on the day I spent most of my time supervising the ringing. Taylors worked hard on the new one, and decided it was ready after all, albeit in a very incomplete state. Still very much work in progress, but the bells were ringable and tried by a large number of people, some of whom told me that the bells didn't handle

as well as those on the Lichfield. This was significant, as one of the objectives of the new mobile is for the bells to handle as much like full-size ones as possible.

One of the features of the Roadshow was an exhibition of interesting items associated with ringing, and I took a North Staffs peal book, one of the few still written up in the grand manner, in our case by Norman Sharp.

We were saddened by the news of the Queen's death on September 8th and did half an hour of half-muffled (we only have one set) ringing at noon on the following day. When we started ringing, I realised that our muffles have become rather thin, so that the contrast was not as great as it should be. Time for a new set!



QUEEN ELIZABETH'S DROP SCONES

In honour of all things ROYAL, drop scones, otherwise known as Scotch Pancakes, Queen Elizabeth II made for President Eisenhower on the occasion of his visit to Balmoral castle in 1959.

According to records Queen Elizabeth II prepared drop scones for the President, using a family recipe. She later sent the President a letter enclosing the recipe. With a suggestion to use treacle instead of caster sugar.

INGREDIENTS

150g plain flour 1tsp bicarbonate soda 1 tsp crème of tartar Pinch salt

2 eggs

50g caster sugar

150ml milk

2 tablespoons melted butter (for cooking)

METHOD

Beat all the ingredients (minus the butter) together, leave to



stand for a short while.

Add a small knob of butter to the pan (not too high a temperature) and using a table spoon, drop the mixture into the hot butter, using the pointed end of the tablespoon to make rounds.

Cook until larger bubbles appear then turn over.
